NJSL Report for YASS Meeting, November 15, 2019

2019 Summer Reading Program Statistics

For the first time, NJ public libraries completed the same survey as nine other CSLP states in a pilot project created to collect summer reading statistics. The joint survey was instituted so that there would be consistency and standardization of results across all participating states.

The survey did not ask how many books were read. It asked whether participants had completed the minimum goal that their library set. Therefore, the final numbers this year will be much different from past surveys. The goal that most libraries are striving for is to evolve from summer reading to summer learning. States are working toward measuring what young people learn through summer enrichment activities or through quality-time spent reading rather than just counting numbers of books read. The survey also eliminated the question asking how many registered for the program and asked how many participated. A number of libraries no longer take registration.

Comparison between 2018 and 2019 Summer Reading Statistics

It is impossible to do a comparison between years because the questions are different regarding whether those participating reached their goal set by the library. However, a comparison can be made between programs offered and program attendance between 2018 and 2019.

All Ages

Total programs offered - all ages: 37,820 – up from 2018 (35,348), **7% increase**

Total program attendance- all ages: 795,685 – up from 2018 (719,470), **11%increase**

Childrens and Teens Totals Compared to 2018

Total programs offered – 29,397 – up from 2018 (27,769), **6% increase**

Total program attendance – 687,412 – up from 2018 (612,518), **12% increase**

Adult Totals Compared to 2018

Total programs offered – 8,423 – up from 2018 (7,579), **11% increase**

Total program attendance – 108,273 – up from 2018 (106,952), **1.2% increase**

Libraries = Success Public Library Card Campaign in Schools

Forty-five partnering public and school libraries participated in the Libraries = Success Public Library Card Campaign in September during National Library Card Sign-Up month. As of November 8, 2019, thirty-two of the partnering libraries have submitted final statistics. At 54 events, library staff signed up 2,459 new library card owners (most were new cards but some were replacements – 2375 children's and 84 adults). Over 1,000 students attended these events during the months of September (and into October). Public and school libraries received posters and a limited number of earbuds and tote bags provided by the State Library for the first students who registered for public library cards. This initiative was a joint project between NJSL, NJLA, NJASL and DOE, who provided funding for two statewide databases accessible by students in school and public libraries.

Opioid Overdose Prevention Training

The New Jersey State Library is coordinating an informational program in an effort to facilitate discussion around the topic of opioid overdose and naloxone (NARCAN) administration in libraries. The free training will be held on December 16.

- How to recognize the signs of an opioid overdose
- How to administer Naloxone (NARCAN), a medication that reverses an opioid overdose
- Each participant will be eligible to receive a free single-dose Naloxone kit
